Wakulla Springs Water School

Ever wanted to learn more about how Florida's springs work? What lives there? Where does the water come from, and where does it go?

This two-day trip is based out of Wakulla Springs Lodge. The basic registration (\$95) includes three meals, a riverboat tour of the Wakulla River, a hike to sinkholes and karst features at Leon Sinks Geological Area and Cherokee Sink, and presentations by expert field guides. The second day concludes with an optional paddle trip down the Wakulla River (\$15-\$35 according to boat option). Stay overnight at the historic Wakulla Springs Lodge or one of two other very nice hotels nearby.
