Barton Family Farm, Holmes County

en Barton is the 2013 Holmes County Ag Innovator of the Year. Ken and his wife Rhonda have been farming together in Holmes County for over 32 years. Ken and Rhonda grew up on local farms and Rhonda is a third generation farmer here in Holmes County. Together they operate a 1,200 acre diversified farm raising peanuts, cotton, oats, hay, and beef cattle. It is not unusual to see Rhonda on the tractor cutting cotton stalks or operating the module builder during cotton harvest. They have two children, Tonya and Chad, and four grandchildren, who are also involved in the family farm. Daughter Tonya is married to Kevin Amerson and they have two children, Kason, age 7 and Kolton, age 4. Tonya is an elementary school teacher at Bethlehem School and Kevin is employed with Dothan Livestock as a field representative. Kevin also has a cow/ calf operation and produces oats and hay. Tonya, Kason, and Kolton are always eager to help with the hay operation or assist in working the cattle. Chad is married to Ashley Miller and they have two children, Kenny age 4, and Kaylee age 2. Chad is employed at Fort Rucker as an aircraft mechanic. Chad is also a 50/50 partner in the row-crop operation of the farm. Ashley is a stay at home mom and helps out on the

farm by running errands and picking up parts or supplies. Kenny and Kaylee love the time they spend in the field or in a tractor helping Ken and Rhonda.

Ken is a strong advocate of utilizing GPS technology, grid sampling, and variable rate fertilization for crop production to increase efficiency, protect natural resources, and reduce production costs. His farm is an excellent example of utilizing best management practices including crop rotation and integrated pest management in an agricultural operation.

In 2003, in addition to his farming activities, Ken became the Executive Director of the Florida Peanut Producers Association where he represents the peanut farmers of the state of Florida in Tallahassee and Washington, D.C. He has provided strong leadership to the organization and is heavily involved in research, promotion, and education as it relates to Florida peanut production, leading to innovation in varieties, cropping systems, and youth education.

Ken and Rhonda are members of the Florida Peanut Producers Association, the Southern Peanut Farmers Federation, Florida Cattlemen's Association, and Florida Farm Bureau Federation.




Improving Agriculture through Extension Involvement

Ken has also supported and participated in youth educational activities in Holmes County including the annual Ag in the Classroom for Holmes and Washington County 5th grade students. 
Impacting Agriculture in Northwest Florida
