"Learn by Doing"

- Core 4-H philosophy
- Experiential learning
 - "Experimental Education takes place when a person involved in an activity looks back and evaluates it, determines what was useful or important to remember, and uses this information to perform another activity." (John Dewey, 1938)

Advantages of Experiential Learning

- More fun discovery
- Gives youth a voice
- Empowering
- Fosters belonging
- Like play





Principles of Teaching

- Youth learn best in an atmosphere of warmth and acceptance (belonging).
- Youth want to be actively involved in setting their own goals and in planning their activities (independence).
- Youth have different abilities, they learn at their own rate, and yet they want to be challenged (mastery).





- Youth have knowledge and wisdom to share.
- Youth respond to both self-motivation and external motivation.
- Self-evaluation is the most meaningful kind of evaluation.





Learning Preparation

- What do you want to accomplish?
- What is the size and age range of the group?
- Is the atmosphere conductive to learning?
- Know what equipment and other materials you will need. Make sure they are in working order.
- Know the subject you will be teaching.
- Be comfortable.

- Experiments

- Identification/Matching
- Skill-a-thons
- Role-playing
- Skits

Choosing a Method

- Purpose of program
- Number of participants/space available
- Age(s) and interests of participants
- Equipment, materials, assistance, funds available
- Time available





Developmental Characteristics





Don't forget:

- Be prepared by planning ahead
- Choose methods appropriate for audience
- Practice!
- Involve group members both in planning and delivery
- Use an action-oriented approach

Recreation

- Recreation= A Recipe for Success
 - Fun filled activities help provide enthusiasm and enjoyment throughout the club meeting.





What does Recreation accomplish?

• From the group standpoint, recreation can help to create a favorable atmosphere, increase participation, facilitate communication, set group standards, and develop leadership.





When to use Recreation

- In a newly formed group
- The arrival of the first members
- During the meeting to shift from the general "gab session"





Why is Team Building important?

- Skills learned are important to personal and group development.
- Communicating with others.
- Work towards a common goal.
- Being an effective team member or team leader they develop confidence in their own abilities.





2 things we learn from Team Building!

- 1. How to work with others.
 - 2. Communication skills.

Skills Built!
