





Where We've Been – Where We're Going

Prices Received for Cattle by Month - United States






USDA – NASS 1/31/2024 Our perennial pastures grasses are tough – they can really take a beating...

Getting Our Pastures
Back in Shape –
Areas of Investment

- Soil Fertility
- Grazing Management
- Weed Management

Soil Fertility

- Get a soil test(s).
- Fix your pH.
- N-P-K
 - Nitrogen \$0.70/lbs. down from \$1.10/lbs.
 - Phosphorus \$0.65/lbs. down from \$0.80/lbs.
 - Potassium \$0.50/lbs. down from \$0.75/lbs.
- Hay fields are not the same as grazed pastures.

Legume Integration



- Invest in infrastructure necessary to facilitate rotational grazing.
 - Fence
 - Water
 - Shade
- There's nothing better for a pasture than a rest.
- It gets easier with time and practice.
- Cost share opportunities.

Stocking Rate

Weed Management

- Only makes sense if done in concert with proper grazing & fertility management.
- Pay particular attention to weedy grasses.
 - Cogon, Smut, Broomsedge, Centipede, etc.
- Do it "right" or don't waste your time/money.
 - Correctly ID weeds
 - Get (and follow) a well-informed herbicide rec.
 - product, rate, adjuvants, timing, <u>delivery</u>
 - Mowing is seldom the best answer.

Pasture Renovation

Make the investment, take care of your pastures now, while times are good, so they will be able to take care of you when times get tight.
